



Summer arrived with bluster and rain, felling trees in some South Carolina gardens, reminding us of the urgency to save our natural resources. Using prudent conservation practices, we focus on effective watering regimes, use of native and heritage plant material and environmentally-friendly garden pest control

NGC/SAR Director Martha Morgan and her husband, Russ, were our guests on April 23 and 24 at our State Meeting. On April 23, members of the Board of Directors held several meetings at Forest Lake Club in Columbia, prior to our Garden Party celebration at our Memorial Garden. Recognized nationally as the first garden dedicated to honor the sacrifices of our brave service members in WWII, this Loutrel Briggs garden is a natural cathedral. Highlighting the garden party was the dedication of a marble plaque, commemorating the contributions of The Columbia Garden Club in restoration work in the garden and the gatehouse. On April 24, statewide garden club members gathered at Forest Lake Club for our State Meeting to conduct business, recognize outstanding work of members and clubs and recognize scholarship winners. Nestled at lakeside, amidst towering trees, Forest Lake Club was the perfect theme location for our Historic Trees for Historic Places project. Each table sported tree-trunk containers, bursting with magnificent, tall arrangements of forsythia, rosemary and other fragrant and blooming heritage plant material. Hand-carved miniature South Carolina trees adorned the tables, including the head table, and each attendee received the prize of a handmade paper tree.

On June 14, statewide members celebrated at The Fair across the street from our South Carolina State House! Held at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral's Averyt Hall, The Fair provided varied opportunities for all GCSC members. Not only could they learn pertinent information at booths of various committee chairmen, but also they could gain information from workshops on awards, the SC Landscape Design Consultants Council and Landscape Design School and SC Judges Club. Additionally, they savored delicious treats, met new friends and celebrated winners of NGC and NGC/SAR awards. What a fabulous way to celebrate GCSC and Flag Day!

Many clubs celebrated significant anniversaries. Among those was the 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of The Garden Club of Saluda, celebrating with day-long events, including a Home and Garden Show, with horticulture displays on Saluda's Main and Church Streets. Also, The Dogwood Garden Club of Orangeburg, celebrated 75 years of service in the community, with a meeting and reception at the Fine Arts Center.

National Garden Week spotlighted numerous events throughout the state. On June 4, the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the D-Day Invasion of Normandy, the Council of Garden Clubs in Sumter held a Blue Star Memorial Dedication in Memorial Park. A town steeped in military tradition with Shaw AFB and The Third Army, Sumter's patriotic spirit shone through the meaningful and beautiful dedication ceremony planned and hosted by the Sumter Council of Garden Clubs. Current and former military members, civic leaders, high school ROTC and American Legion representatives joined GCSC President Judith Dill, East Sandhills District Director Fair Edmunds, GCSC Blue Star Chair Paula Bowen and other GCSC members in the flower presentation, unveiling and dedication of the Blue Star Memorial Marker in Memorial Park. What a moving and meaningful National Garden Week celebration of our nation's liberty!

The SC Judges Club celebrated National Garden Week with a Standard Flower Show, *The Joy of Books*, in Greenwood, SC, as a part of Greenwood's Festival of Flowers. Held in the Greenwood County Library, the flower show featured designs interpreting intriguing book titles. The horticulture divisions, *A Day in the Library*, included a wealth of entries representing various book titles. The educational exhibits also featured book titles featuring conservation and preservation of our natural resources.





#### **ENERGY CONSERVATION**

#### **Improving the Indoor Environment**

Wow fellow members, with just five cleaners we can naturally clean our indoor environment and you probably have them on hand. Household cleaning products engineered to annihilate every smudge or germ in their path are great for keeping a home sparkling. Some of the chemicals they contain, however, may be less than beneficial for the environment and you. In fact, certain cleaning chemicals can cause a number of health problems, including headaches, allergic reactions and respiratory issues.

These five readily available cleaners are considered low risk for the planet and people.

**Baking Soda.** Sodium Bicarbonate, aka baking soda, is used for reducing odors in the fridge. Use it to clean and deodorize other areas of your home and to remove stains and grease. In the bathroom, it can act as a no-scratch abrasive for showers and sinks.

**Borax.** Borax is a great laundry booster, but its benefits do not end in the laundry room. This natural mineral can be used for cleaning projects all over the house, including scrubbing bathtubs, toilets, and sinks; cleaning ovens and stove tops; and mopping floors. It should be mentioned that borax, a compound of the chemical element boron, is not the same as boric acid, a weak acid of boron commonly found in roach powders.

**Vinegar.** This mild common acid solution can cut through tough stains in the kitchen; clean and degrease counters, microwaves and ovens; and deodorize disposals and drains. Outside of the kitchen, use vinegar to clean glass and windows, remove mold and mildew in the bathroom, and deodorize mattresses.

Castile Soap. Because castile soap is made with plant oils rather than animal fats and is a "true soap" rather than a chemical, it is lauded as a completely biodegradable, earth-friendly cleaning alternative. Castile soap, which is a type rather than a brand, is available in bars and as a bottled liquid. It can be used to clean you, as body soap or a shampoo. Around the house, use Castile formulations to launder clothes, scrub stains, clean floors and wash dishes.

**Lemon Juice.** Lemon juice can be used to wipe out odors on countertops and in garbage disposals, refrigerators and microwaves. The acidic juice can also lift stains from kitchen containers, lighten laundry and remove rust stains.

#### "Recipes for cleaning green"

For the toilet: Put \(^1/4\) cup of vinegar in the toilet bowl and drizzle a splash of vinegar on the rim. Let the mixture sit in the toilet for an hour, and then scrub the bowl and flush. For especially tough stains, add a little borax.


Washing windows: Mix 1 quart of warm water with 2 tablespoons of vinegar in a spray bottle and shake the mixture well. Spray it on windows and, in order to avoid streaks, rub off with newspaper.

Scrubbing sinks and tubs: Mix 1 cup of baking soda with ½ cup of Castile soap until it thickens. If you want to add fragrance, mix in a drop of your essential oil.

#### Quick Tip - "Check Labels"

As people become more environmentally conscious, many companies have tapped into that interest by offering green cleaning products. That doesn't mean the ingredients in these household cleaners are safe. Read the label of any cleaning product – and pass on those that do not list ingredients.

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#### ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION ~ LITTER ~ RECYCLING

Now that summer has officially arrived and the temperatures are above ninety degrees, I see more and more people carrying one of those ubiquitous plastic water bottles in one hand and their i-pod in the other. It is of course important to keep hydrated, especially when the heat levels reach industrial strength, but it is also important that we dispose of these plastic bottles in a way that doesn't impact the environment.

An even better idea for the environment would be to not use these plastic bottles at all and use refillable aluminum bottles instead. Since learning that bottled water is 1,900 times more expensive than water from my kitchen tap, I've kept three waterfilled light weight aluminum bottles in my refrigerator at all times. It is easy to grab one as I rush out the door and they fit perfectly in the beverage holder in the car and seem to stay cooler longer than a plastic bottle.

In addition to the environmental impact caused by discarded plastic bottles, are the potentially serious health issues they can cause. Most of us are savvy enough not to leave a plastic water bottle in a parked car in the summer, then drink from it again after the water has cooled, but how many of us can know with any certainty what temperature fluctuations our bottled water endured before it was purchased? The cargo area of transport trucks varies in temperature, but during the summer, cargo bays can register as high as one hundred and fifty degrees. At high temperatures plastic is not stable and is capable of leaching BPA [Bisphenol –A] into the contents of the bottle. BPA is a known breeding ground for cancer causing cells.

There are dozens of good reasons to re-cycle and since starting my summer reading/ research for these articles I came across some new information on recycling paper and glass that I also wanted to share with you.

Did you know that a ton of paper made from recycled waste paper saves seventeen trees, 7,000 gallons of water and 4,100 kilowatts of energy...that is 30-55% less energy than making new paper directly from trees! Making paper from recycled sources also creates 74% less air pollution than making paper from virgin wood pulp.

When a ton of glass is re-cycled, water consumption is reduced by 50%, air pollution by14% and mining wastes by 79% over making glass from scratch. These statistics were significant enough to make me realize that if all of us change our habits just a *little* we <u>can</u> make a difference. Stay Cool-Happy Summer!


