### THE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

"Inspire Conservation Through Education"

The Fall Board Meeting of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. "Rising Tides", could not have chosen a lovelier location than the Holiday Inn by the Bay in Portland, Maine to host this very important meeting. We were to attend to the business at hand, but were anxious to see the beautiful port and view the Historic Parks/Landmarks, Victoria Mansion and Longfellow House; riding on the cobblestone streets was a unique experience, as well.



Of course, we enjoyed shopping and dining in the excellent "Portland Dine Around" and the creativity of the world-class chefs who have

settled in the area. The food was absolutely delicious, and it gave the Region Directors an opportunity to relax, enjoy and share the common goals of making NGC a more viable organization by serving as the mediators between the states and NGC. This is what we have been responsible for since 1937-1939 when the South Atlantic Region's first Director was Mrs. Frederick A. Wallis from Paris, Kentucky.

There was a good representation from all areas of the United States, anxious to be informed about the status of the eight Regions that are now in place. These Directors represent the members from our fifty states and the National Capitol Area

The Executive Board met early on Thursday morning and, after attending to some business matters, our NGC Parliamentarian Joan H. Corbisiero stated that, "Our NGC By-laws cannot be changed in so far as anything that relates to our Regional Structure until May 2018. Which means nothing that affects our Regions can be in place until the 2021-2023 Administration. Then it will have to be by a 2/3 majority."

I have been informed by our SAR Treasurer June Ashworth that, on Tuesday, October 4, 2016, the South Atlantic Region Association received a letter from the Internal Revenue Service stating, "We determined you're exempt from federal income tax under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501 (c) (3). Donors can deduct contributions they make to you under IRC Section 1170. You're also qualified to receive tax deductible bequests, devises, transfers or gifts under section 2055, 2106, 2522."

We have been instructed on how to file and the Account Period will end May 31 as in the past.

We want to thank June Ashworth, SAR Finance Chairman and the Appointed Committee that worked together to make this a reality. We will now move forward and encourage prospective members to join our organization.

Prayerfully, by the time this is read by our SAR members in North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky and South Carolina, we will have escaped severe damage from the Hurricane "Matthew". God Bless Each of You.

### AIR AND WATER QUALITY

The American Lung Association has written much about Healthy Air....Why do they do this? Because the air that goes into your lungs is extremely important to your health. When you are outside tending to your garden, is the air you breathe good or bad and how will you know? Your city or county can give you that information. The Clean Air Act helps control many of the pollutants that could make our air "bad".

You are the one who can do much to increase the quality of air in your house. The American Lung Association had some suggestions on how to do this:

- \* Proper ventilation can keep the indoor air fresh
- \* Keep your house smoke free
- \* Keep humidity levels under 50% (a dehumidifier will help with that) Humidity increases the growth of mold and mildew
- \* Leaks and drips also contribute to the growth of mold
- \* Keep air ducts and air filters clean.
- Bad odors can be caused by something toxic. Find out what the cause is instead of masking it with sprays or candles.
- \* Chemical cleaning products, paint, and even new carpet can emit toxins.

We, here in Wilmington, are in the path of a Hurricane, so I remind myself that flooding and standing water can bring about a problem with both air quality and water quality.





### **AWARDS**

A question has been raised from a new State Awards Chairman, and the information may be of assistance to others who work with awards in their clubs, states, etc.

It is VERY important to read both the SAR Awards list for 2015 - 17 AND the NGC Awards List for this administration. All the rules are there, and some of the NGC award rules say "date due is determined by your state". That date must be set in accordance with SAR Awards Rules which are, in turn, set according to NGC Award Rules. If you do not have an SAR Directory in order to access the awards information, please check the SAR Website:

www.southatlanticregiongardenclubs.org.

We in SAR had had NO mention of YEARBOOKS in our awards listing in past years, and there were always questions about them, but in attempting to improve the situation, something went wrong. YEARBOOKS are listed as "No.26 in the SAR Directory. Please read on in order to understand: All NGC Yearbook Awards are # 16. All are judged at REGIONAL LEVEL, and ONLY THE LIST OF WIN-NERS IS SENT TO NGC. They are NOT JUDGED at NGC: Regions do that (BIG) job for the NGC Awards Committee. EACH YEARBOOK SHOULD BEAR THE NA-TIONAL AWARD NUMBER, AS #16 A, #16 B, ETC. IF clubs send their applications to state awards chairmen with another number on them, we ask that the State Awards Chairman adjust the numbers for the clubs by adding the correct #16, etc. So, in the SAR, Yearbooks are to be submitted on the same date as ALMOST all other awards.

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There is one date set in the states for clubs to submit their awards applications to the District Awards Chairman, who gets them judged and submits winners to the State Awards Chairman by Dec. 15. The State Awards Chairman gets applications judged and submits them in two directions: Those going to SAR are to arrive to this chairman by JANUARY 25, all in one package, with an enclosed list of those being submitted. ONE COPY only. NO half sheets with NGC Award Application Form, as clubs are supposed to use that form when they create their application and begin telling their project story. Award applications going from states to NGC are to arrive there by JANUARY 15, and only STATE Awards Chairmen send those. The Regional Awards Chairmen does NOT send applications on to National Chairman. This process is always confusing to those who have not worked with the awards system beyond their own club or state

CONTINUING: PUBLICITY PRESS BOOKS ARE DUE to STATE AWARDS CHAIRMEN BY JANUARY 25. Read those rules for SAR & NGC levels of competition in their respective awards rules. Press book winners in each category are sent by the State Awards Chairman to the SAR Publicity Press Book Chairman, Barbara Ohmsen by FEBRUARY 23. She gets those judged and sends the list of winners to the SAR Awards Chairman.

Careful Reading is important in understanding the garden club awards system. And then, you may need to ask some questions. SAR AWARD applications are to be submitted in hard copy for this last year of the administration. Applications will not be accepted by email. Thanks to all those working with awards in our Region. I look forward to receiving packages from each state in January.






# BIRDS Betty Gorrie CHIMNEY SWIFT

I hope many of you were able to catch the migration of the Chimney Swifts as they were on their way to Peru. They will, for the most part, be out of North Carolina by the second week of October. The "Swift" is a very small bird, a "cigar" shaped slender body with very long, narrow and curved wings. When the bird lands, it can't perch – it clings to vertical walls inside chimneys or in hollow trees or caves. This little bird spends its life in the air, eating and drinking. It is a sight to behold watching them come in at dusk to roost in an old chimney or smoke stack. You can see them for miles coming to form a large, black funnel shape over the opening and will circle in this funnel until one flies in and then the black funnel starts to disappear into the chimney. If you are lucky, you may still see them at dusk in a chimney near you.

### CONTAINER GARDENING

Helen Heater "Change of Seasons"

It is hard to resist the lure of a garden filled with all of those bright, cheerful and beautiful blooms, no matter what the season. So how do we get or keep that lush flower filled look for just a bit longer into fall. A big container to start!

With the change of the fall season, the weather will definitely change, the temperatures drop, frost appears in most places and/or sunny days are cut shorter. So find that large container, (at least 16 inches in diameter), walk around your garden and let that beautiful bloom give you that inspiration to develop that fall container. Lift a mum just beginning to bloom, some dusty miller, maybe a pansy or two, some marigolds, a small sedum plant, verbena or some purple salvia just to name a few things.

Combine these beautiful plants in your container, add some sphagnum moss to hold the moisture, and water well. The key is not to disturb the root system too much in the transplanting process. Give them a little shot of energy (i.e.) fertilizer/plant food to stabilize the plant into this new season. You will have beautiful color for a bit longer into late fall. Most of these plants can take cooler nights for a while.

Now you are ready to set the container in your favorite place, an entry way on your porch or patio. Just make sure the place is well balanced to get full sun with proper moisture and protected for a while longer against the possible frost.

For avid gardeners it is hard to let go of all that beautiful color, knowing that the color scheme will change to mostly white or brown shortly. However, that's a part of the change of seasons. We get inspired, we work hard, we need rest and time to rejuvenate our bodies and minds.

But wait; by the way don't forget spring will be right around the corner. So don't forget to get those tulips and daffodil bulbs in another container also this fall, give them some bone -meal for nourishment for winter. Once planted, water well. If your temperatures get below freezing for longer periods of time, place the container in your garage or a semi- protected area for a while depending on your particular area.

You will be happy or inspired again with all that beautiful bloom on your patio, porch or entry way, even in your gardens in the spring. You'll be one of the first to have bloom in town, but for now enjoy the "Change of Seasons."

Grassroots Green

Returning recently from a month's vacation, I began the task of tackling my overgrown garden, which had gone rampant while I was away.


The heavy summer rains and southern sun had turned the garden into a tangled mess, and it was two days before I pruned away enough greenery to see ground level. Instead of seeing rich brown earth under the lush greenery, I discovered that the rains had floated tiny jibblets of styrofoam to the surface of all the beds and the entire kitchen garden was awash with them! I had *no* idea that the potting soil in the bedding plants and herbs that I had purchased in the spring contained so much of the stuff! The more I scraped the surface the more white particles emerged.

[I should perhaps note here that *Styrofoam* is a trade name for products made from a petroleum- based plastic called polystyrene. These products are not recyclable in most communities and are <u>not</u> biodegradable].

The morning after my first workday in the garden, I read a timely article in our local newspaper about how polystyrene has become a growing hazard to the local environment. The article reported that City Council members at Folly Beach had just unanimously passed the first reading of an ordinance forbidding the use of foam coolers, food and beverage containers, balloons and single use plastic bags on the beach. This ordinance will need a second reading to become law, but public opinion seems to support Council's actions to levy fines up to \$100.00 for a first offence. Accompanying the article was also a report on the increasing number of turtles that have recently been brought to the Charleston Aquarium critter hospital for treatment after ingesting foam particles. Turtles apparently mistake these floating particles in the ocean as a food source and the results can be deadly. Turtles are not the only marine life to be affected, minute particles of foam have also been found in shrimp and fish. Through autopsies, doctors are also beginning to discover minute traces of plastic as neurotoxins in the human brain. Humans can ingest these neurotoxins from hot foods and liquids that break down the surfaces of styrene containers. Scientists at the National Research Council have now affirmed that styrene is a carcinogen that causes cancer in

Back in the garden, I was disturbed yesterday by the discovery that these foam particles were sluicing down my driveway during an afternoon rainstorm and headed for the street drain that empties into Charleston's harbour. I've now started sifting the dirt in the kitchen garden through screen wire to minimize the problem, but while doing so, it occurred to me that garden club members could encourage plant nurserys not to use foam particles as an additive to potting soil, and we could curb our personal use of foam packing materials and food containers. Individually, we can all do *something* to help the environment, but more importantly, since garden clubs are the largest volunteer organization in America, collectively our voices could make a BIG difference. We could also collectively use our voices to limit the use of polystyrene.

The Committee appointed to try to obtain the 501 (c) 3 Tax Exempt Status for the South Atlantic Region is happy to report that a letter has been received from the IRS stating "we determined you're exempt from federal income tax under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501 (C) 3. Donors can deduct contributions they make to you under IRC Section 170. You're also qualified to receive tax deductions bequests, devises, transfers or gifts under Section 2055, 2106 or 2522." We are required to file Form 990 each year. After our 2017 Convention, we will transfer our funds into the new EIN number and notify NGC.

We would like to thank all that voted and allowed us to make the IRS application possible.


# THE CORRIE WHITLOCK MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FROM SAR

Scholarships are the way that we can open many doors for students, as well as make a tremendous contribution to the future needs of our communities. A qualifying student is one who is majoring in the study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Botany, Plant Pathology, Biology, Environmental Conservation, Forestry, Land Management, Agronomy, Agriculture Education, Wildlife Science, City Planning and/or allied subjects. As Garden Club Members, these are important to all of us and the quality of our lives.

The South Atlantic Region will be offering **TWO** Scholarships to a rising Junior or Senior in College. The Scholarships are each worth \$2000. Each of the Five States in the Region may submit one application to be considered for a Scholarship. A previous winner and /or applicant can apply each year that they qualify. Applications may be obtained from the SAR Scholarship Chairman or the Scholarship Chairman of each state in the region. Information and applications can also be found on the SAR Website.

The Scholarship applications are judged by a committee of SAR Members and presented at the SAR Spring Meeting.



Complete Applications must be sent to the State Scholarship Chairman by February 1<sup>st</sup>. Each State's best application for the SAR Scholarship must be sent to the SAR Scholarship Chairman by March 1<sup>st</sup>.

The following Scale of Points is used to evaluate each application:

Academic Record	40 %
Applicant's Letter	30 %
Listing of Honors/ Extracurricular	
Activities/ Work Experience	10 %
Financial Need	15 %
Recommendations	5 %

The State Scholarship Chairman may submit a Scholarship Application for the NGC, Inc. Scholarship. This is due to the NGC Scholarship Chairman and must be postmarked by March 15<sup>th</sup>. The NGC Chairman will consider only one application from each State, with one exception. Any State having a membership over 10,000 as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, may submit two applications. These Scholarships are worth \$3500. SAR Members....Scholarships are an important way to secure our future goals in beautification and environmental concerns through Education. Let's make sure that we send an applicant from each State in our region to the SAR and NGC Scholarship Chairmen for consideration.





### WILDFLOWER / ROADSIDES

Recently my Husband and I went out West for our Anniversary and enjoyed fly-fishing in Montana, Idaho and Wyoming! This SAR Chairman for Wildflowers Roadsides enjoyed fishing the Madison near Quake Lake, Montana and noticed in September that Ox-Eye Daisies were still blooming!

In 1972 this Chairman founded a garden club in Spartanburg ,SC named "Upsy Daisy Garden Club" which is still very active in all levels of Garden Club". So I always look for the Daisy Wildflower. In studying for this article I noticed that many states prohibit this wildflower. Please do your homework to check that the wildflowers you plant are not on the "Noxious And Invasive Lists".

The Ox Eye Daisy is one of the toughest perennials! This wildflower is also easy to Grow!

Remember: When you pulled off the white petals saying ,"He Loves Me -He Loves Me Not"? As you would end with the last petal you hoped it would be "He Loves Me" Ox Eye Daisies light up the landscape with "white" and bloom profusely! They usually bloom in the summer. They grow up to 30 inches depending on the soil and may grow to 3 feet. In North America the Ox-Eye Daisy has become naturalized and also may be on the invasive list.

Ox-Eye Daisy may be called Maudlinwort and Dun Daisy. The wild shasta daisy can be substituted in the states which OxEye Daisy is prohibited.

### OX-EYE DAISY, LEUCANTHEMUM VULGARE

The Origins of this Plant began in Europe in the British Isles and the Russian parts of Asia, including Siberia.




# YOUTH PROJECTS - GIRL SCOUTS



There will be pre-convention tours of interest. Also, we always have interesting and unusual vendors.


The room rates are very reasonable: \$139 single or double; \$139 triple; \$149 quad.


