State Presidents' Themes and Reports



The Garden Club of Kentucky, Inc. Edith S. Nelson, President "Paying the Pathway to the Future"

The beginning of a new year is a time for reflecting on the accomplishments of the past year and a time to plan and focus on new ideas and projects for 2017. As you spend winter days with your gardening books and seed catalogs, remember to select seeds for native plant pollinator gardens and monarch waystations.

The Garden Club of Kentucky has seen a big increase in the number of certified gardens that ensure a brighter future for pollinators in our state. Kentucky has increased the number of Certified Monarch Waystations from 36 in 2013 to 404 through October 2016. Thanks to State Park Chairman, Joanna Kirby, we now have Monarch Waystations in 15 Kentucky State Parks. Linda Porter, Pollinator and Butterfly Chairman reported that public and private agencies across the state have joined forces to develop a Monarch Conservation Plan for Kentucky.

A park in Henderson, Kentucky has been offering to the public the opportunity to catch and tag Monarch butterflies to aid in tracking their migration paths to Mexico for the winter. Before being released, a small round sticker with identifying information is placed on the underside of the Monarch's back wing. Our garden club members have a huge impact in their communities as they beautify and improve them with the many volunteer hours spent each year. They continue to maintain gardens and waystations at Regional Airports, Arboretums, Nursing homes, Assisted living homes, Historical Society, National and State Parks, City welcome signs, and our State Headquarters. Garden Club for Noble Park received a \$5,000 watershed grant

to sponsor a rain garden workshop and to develop a rain garden to remedy a major water problem in the Parks Children's Memorial. While *Paving the Pathway to the Future*, we are making progress with our youth clubs. Youth Chairman, Ann Kowalkoski and her committee reports that all five districts have participated in youth activities including projects at a public library, work day at a park with pollinators, hands-on activities, and applying for Youth Awards.

Many flower shows have been held this year. One show was held in conjunction with a district meeting. Members placed entries in shows at fairs and city celebrations. Programs included creative designs and how to prepare for a flower show. The Garden Club of Kentucky and Middlesboro Garden Club will host Flower Show Course IV on March 16-17, 2017 in Middlesboro, Kentucky. Our Symposium, sponsored by Kentucky Council of Nationally accredited Flower Show Judges of GCKY, will be held June 14-15, 2017 at Carter Caves State Park, Olive Hill, Kentucky.

Corbin Garden Club and Lady Slippers Garden Club in Mountain Laurel District, each installed and dedicated a Blue Star Memorial Marker for Veterans Day. What a beautiful way to honor our servicemen and women with a memorial that will beautify and preserve the land for which they fought.

I'm looking forward to seeing each of you at South Atlantic Region Convention in White Sulphur Springs, WV March 26-28, 2017.

The Garden Club of South Carolina is blooming right into 2017!





Virginia Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. Janice M. Clem, President

Theme: "Making Connections to Shape the Future"

Through VFGC's Keys to the Future Youth Projects Grants, ten clubs received over \$7,000 for projects that will reach more than 1,100 youth. Some of the projects in which the Youth will participate include creating raised gardening beds, planting butterfly way stations, learning about birds and making a bird feeder, learning about an amphibian's life cycle (based on *The Frightened Frog*), and restoring and planting a children's garden.

VFGC's Grants to Beautify and Restore program awarded over \$4,300 to five clubs to restore the landscaping at the front entrance of the John Marshall house in Richmond; revive and add to the landscape of the Youth Development Center in Winchester; identify and tag native shrubs and vines at the Ellis Acres Memorial Park in Buckingham; beautify a two-acre educational garden at the Community Arboretum at Virginia Western Community College in Roanoke; and restore the area around a visitor's center in Winchester.

VFGC's Horticulture Chairman, Jane Sorensen, shared the following horticulture apps with members:

Leafsnap, Audubon Trees, Audubon Wildflowers, Great Smokey Mountain Wildflowers version 2.0, Plants Pedia, Garden Answers, and Garden Compass Plant. Perhaps you, too, would find these apps helpful.

March will be a busy month for VFGC members as the

spring district meetings will be held earlier than normal so that the VFGC convention can be held earlier.

VFGC's convention will be April 2-4 at the beautiful and historic Hotel Roanoke. Members will be treated to a wide array of programs by our speakers, Dr. Alex Neimiera, Paige Canfield, David Pippin, Al Brockwell, and David Roos and there will be shopping opportunities with our many vendors. One of our districts, Blue Ridge, will sponsor the Standard Flower Show "Making Connections" at the convention.


BIRDS Betty Gorrie CHIMNEY SWIFT

Mark your calendars for February 17 - 20. It is once again time for the Great Backyard Bird Count. This is a great project for club members, grandchildren and especially the Youth Garden Clubs.

The GBBC is a joint project of Cornell Lab of Ornithology, National Audubon Society and is sponsored by Wild Birds Unlimited. The information that you report becomes part of a large data base that helps in important trends in bird populations, their range, habitat changes and any shifts in the migration process. Go to the website

<u>www.gbbc.birdcount.org</u> for all of the information to register and report your sightings.

And......don't forget.....birds will be looking for sources of food, water and shelter now. They need high calorie and high fat foods in the winter. Check at your local specialty bird center for the recommended winter seed, suet cakes and peanuts. There are many recipes for homemade suet on the internet if you prefer to make your own. Water is very important in the winter. Provide a bird bath, if possible, with a bird bath heater. (Some bird baths come with a built in heater.) Also remember, your birds need a place that will provide shelter from the wind, cold and predators.




" A Few Recipes for Sun and Shade"

We always need to be thinking ahead and planning for another successful container garden season, as spring is just around the cor-

There are plenty of options, whether your yard is in the scorching light or deep shade. The following are just a few ideas for a sunny location and/or the shade. Next we need to think about the container types, should they be pedestal, hanging basket or?. Which fits or fills my space best?

Since spring will be here soon, maybe we should think about bright colors and maybe a large pedestal pot. What about a "POP" of bright colors?

Select 4 or 5 miniature orange snapdragons, 1 or 2 orange Calibrachoas, 2 or 3 Nemesias (nemesia fruticans), pink, 2 or 3 yellow pansies, and 1 yellow Wallflower (Erysimum Citronia), yellow. These



As the weather begins to warm, maybe bright and cool would be a better choice in a hanging basket (at least 10 inches in diameter). Begin by planting: 3 Petunias "supertunias" Bordeaux (purple), 3 to 4 Verbenas, (pink), and at least 5 or 6 Lobelias (lobelia erinus, Laguna) trailing lilac type. This combo will look great from spring to early summer. Since they all have trailing tendencies they will look great in a hanging basket.


Or if a hanging basket is not your choice, what about a wicker or traditional handled type basket? Baskets and flowers go together like apple pie and ice cream. Each is great on their own but baskets filled with flowers have a casual or sweet country feel to them. They also make a perfect addition to a porch or a cottage area. If you use this type of basket you may want to prolong it's life by lining the basket with a piece of plastic with some drainage holes before adding your potting mix. Make sure your selection of a basket is at least 10 inches in diameter.


To get that welcoming look: Combine at least 1 Calibrachoa (calidbrachoa "Superbells") a light or bright cherry red; add 2 or 3 Nemesia (nemesia fruticans, "Bluebird"), 1 Twinspur (Diascia Darla "Rose") and 1 or 2 Sweet Alysium (Lobularia maritiana). These will do fine in full sun as long as they have great drainage and even moisture. If the Nemesia begins to fade in early summer just replace them with 1 or 2 Verbenas or Petunias.

If shade is your preference try these combos. First try this "Perfect Duo" You will need a container approx. 12 " or larger. Select a Hosta (Golden Tiara) and a" berry bladder fern" (Cystopteris bulbifera). Both can stand partial to full shade throughout the growing season. These are two great textures and the bright green apple colors will brighten the deepest shaded corner. It is best not to let them dry out. If you want to save these beauties at the end of the season just transplant them in August in your perennial garden and water well.

If the spot is partial shade and your preference is a bit of color and more texture try this combo: You will need: 1 Rex Begonia (the one with the purple or dark edge leaves with the bright pink center), 2 Rush Plants (Jucous "Twisted Arrows Mix:"), 5 or 6 Double Impatiens (impatiens hybrid) and at least 2 Emerald Lace (Plectranthus pertendahlii) For best results of this combination give the begonias well drained soil and a good potting mix and they will do best out of the direct sun light. Make sure your container is at least 12 inches wide or larger.

All of these plants in this article are common at most nurseries. These are quick and simple, and some of these ideas seem to take a bit more maintenance; but working with different flowers give us perhaps better selections for the years to come. Each year I like to try different plants and colors, and different containers. It is good to also keep a garden journal of things that work and note those that don't work very well. I even have some photos that I especially like to keep for future ideas or try again. The ideas are only limited by your imagination and, of course, by actual growing requirements and the space I have to share my ideas. So have fun planting and try new ideas. "It is rewarding."

TRILLIUM cuneatum has been a beautiful Wildflower sometimes found in ditches and along roadsides and grows in "My Neck of Woods" in SC. The preferred soil for growing trillium is woodsy and loamy. This plant is called "Little Sweet Betsy" along with "Large Toad Shade".

Somehow this chairman can just visualize a toad sitting under the "Mottled" leaves and enjoying a moment in the moist woods waiting on a snack to appear!

This Spring blooming Wildflower has a slight fragrance similar to Sweetshrub. This Trillium cuneatum must not be tasty to deer for they do not bother this plant. Trillium cuneatum spreads by "Rhizomes". Rhizomes are horizontal, brownish, short. Bracts are held well above ground and may be blade green to purplish green. Flower borne upon bracts are erect with odor being usually pleasant, faint, spicy. Sepals are widely spreading, variably green, purplestreaked to all petals and are long-lasting. The maroon-purple sepals vary and may be brownish purple, bronze, greenish purple, clear green, yellowish green, pale lemon vellow, or 2-colored, yellow with purple base.


Other names for this trillium: Whip-poor-will flower, cuneate trillium, purple toad shade and bloody butcher.

In occasional clones, flowers open or quickly fade to bright copper bronze, the particular color pattern is consistent from year to year, fading to browner tones with age except in yellow or green forms.

Trillium cuneatum has escaped locally and become established in Michigan and other states. It is most frequent on the limestone-derived soils of southern Kentucky and Tennessee, and is perhaps the most vigorous and certainly the largest of the eastern trilliums.

Lore: The Chippewas treated earache with "second layer of the bark of the root, put in hot water and boil" this was then dropped in the ear.
